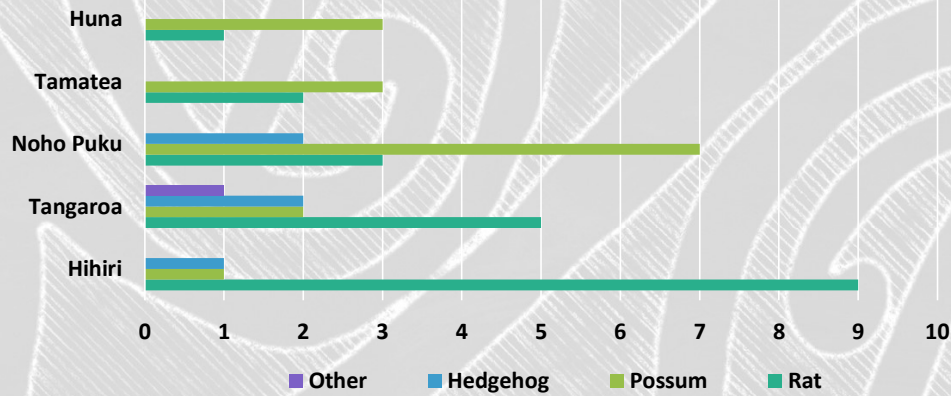

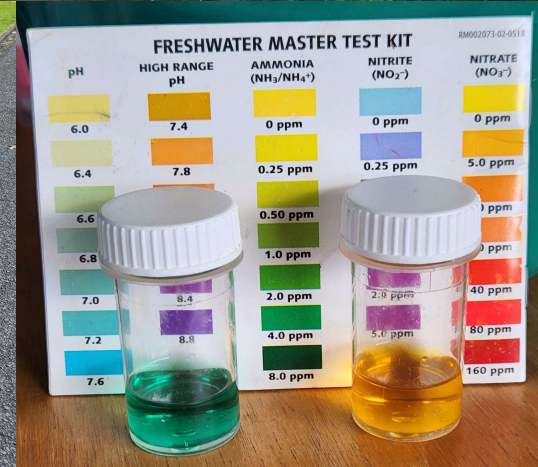
Trap Catch by Maramataka 2023

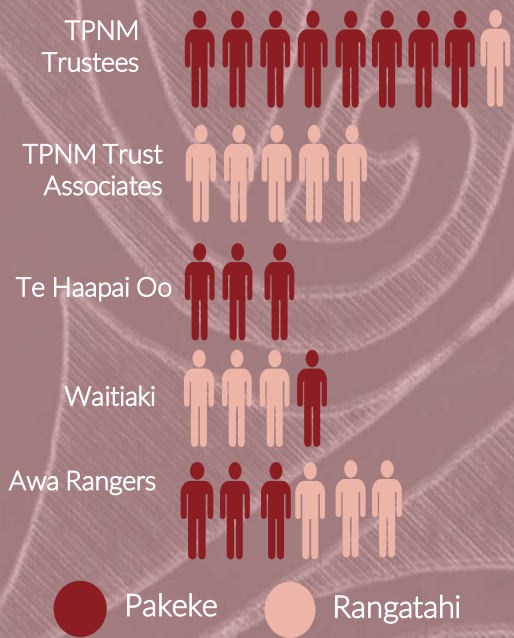

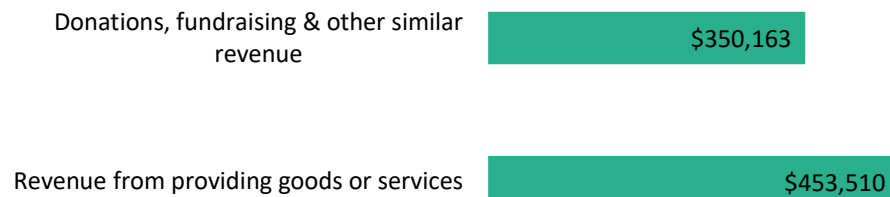

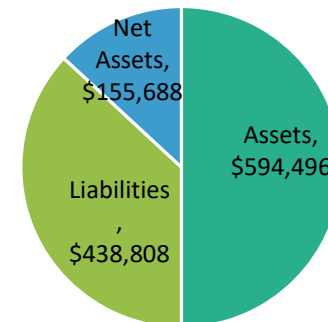
### ANNUAL Expense BREAKDOWN



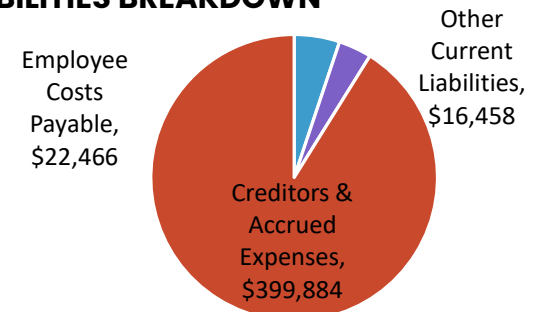
### ANNUAL Revenue BREAKDOWN

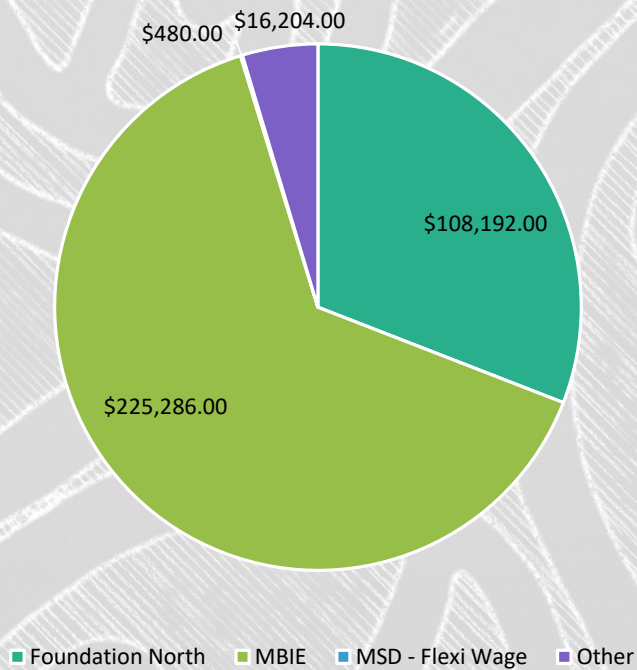
### LIABILITIES BREAKDOWN



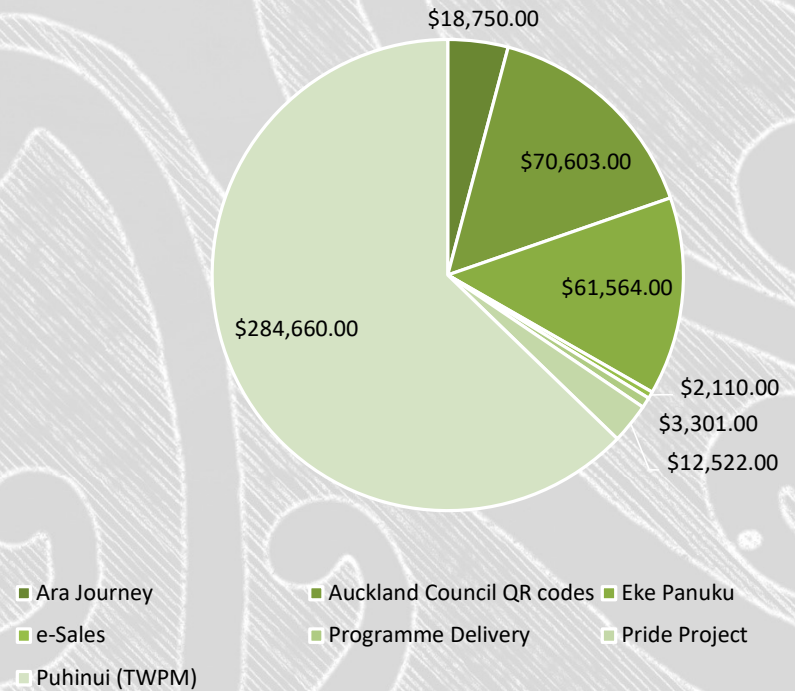


# Revenue Breakdown

## Revenue from Donations



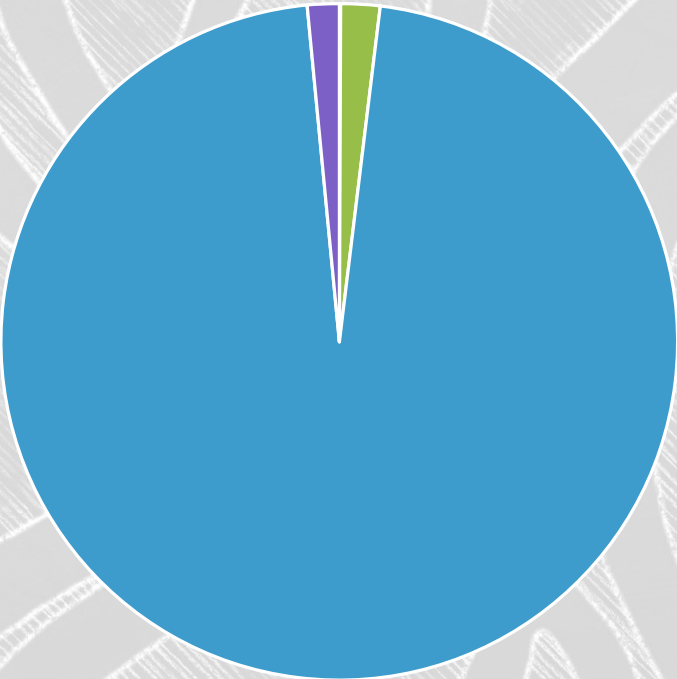
## Revenue from providing Goods and Services





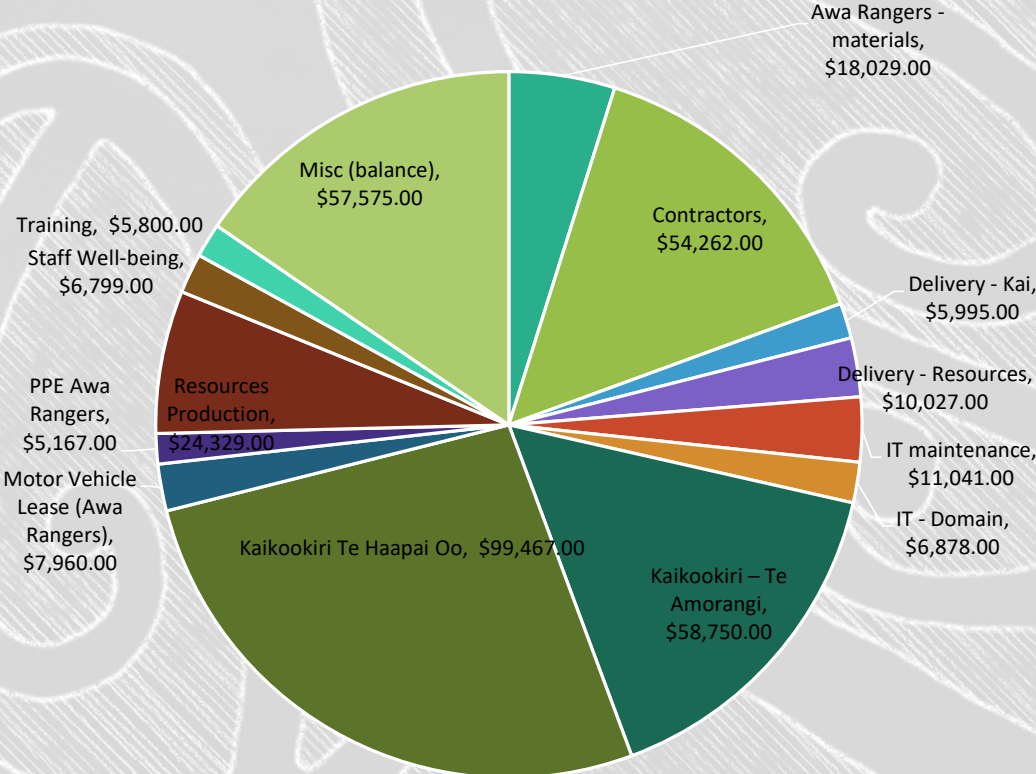
